WLA Member? Please Vote on Bylaws Revision!

WLA is now a 501(c)(3) organization. This organizational change will allow for WLA to apply for grants as well as allow donations to be tax deductible. Since these changes require updating the WLA Bylaws, the WLA Board took the opportunity to remove or replace outdated language, make consistency edits, and take out specific content that is subject to more frequent change. That specific content has been moved into WLA's updated policies and procedures (living documents) instead of being housed in our organization's Bylaws (a general operations document).

The WLA Board recently held a unanimous vote to approve all edits to the WLA Bylaws. It is now **required that our members vote on these same changes**.

Upcoming UW Media Literacy Institute

Support your students to develop media literacy skills, like critical thinking and responsible media consumption and production. This course aims to address the pressing need for students to develop media literacy skills, including critical thinking, discernment, and sharing abilities.

Media literacy is not just an essential subject, but also an engaging approach to support teaching in all disciplines. The National Council of Teachers of English (NCTE) and National Council for the Social Studies (NCSS) both have issued position papers on the importance of media literacy to each of their disciplines.

Through the Media Literacy Institute, participants will gain the skills to effectively utilize the Center for Media Literacy's evidence-based frameworks and pedagogy to create engaging media literacy lessons that empower students.

The Institute sponsored by ConnectEd will be held online **July 31 - Aug 4**. Participants will be able to receive 16 clock hours. The registration fee for this course is \$200.
