

Changing Demographics & Identifying Need: 15 min

Jo will do a quick overview of US and WA trends in demographics (5 min)

- In 2056, for the first time, the older population, age 65 and over, is projected to outnumber the young, age under 18.
- Nationally, ethnic minorities are roughly 1/3 of the population; projected to become the majority by 2043. Washington: Currently 28%
- Asian and Hispanic populations will more than double in 2060.
- By the 2020 Census we will have a majority-minority child population.
 Currently, 47% of children in King County are kids-of-color.
- Immigrant population is 13% nationwide.
- Washington has been termed a "new growth" state for its rapid growth in immigrant and refugee populations. Between 2000 and 2011, Washington has experienced an increase of 48% in its foreign born inhabitants, compared with the national statistic of 29.8%. In 2011, 13.3 % of Washington's total population were immigrants, of these 40% arrived on or after 2000.



Exploring Gaps & Inequities in Our Libraries: 20 min (total)

Gerie will talk about why we do this work? When are libraries not equitable? (5 min)

Issues of equality – a fundamental library value, but let's consider: When are libraries NOT equitable?

Equality can only be realized if everyone starts from the same place.

Note the analogy in this graphic


In an attempt to address this through the lens of equality, all were given the same box, but the outcome was not realized for the 3rd fan because they're not all the same height.

Equity: instead of giving the same boxes to all, the fans who aren't able to see the game are given the help that they need

Sometimes our differences and/or history can create barriers to participation, so we must first ensure equity before we can all enjoy Equality.

(Transition to Ayan): Let's take a look at a specific project that addressed

barriers to library participation and issues of Equity.



Ayan will talk about how the Somali women were identified, their unique needs, the gaps in service to this group (10 min).

Ayan will highlight the following helpful steps in examining inequities in library services and programming:

- Library Observation--Taking a step back and examining your library services & programs for inequities - Whose coming into our library and attending programming? Whose not? Most of the time the individuals who are not utilizing library resources are people who can be impacted the most.
- Community Discovery--Get to know who's in your community. Find the time to listen to the needs of underserved groups especially to those who may not know about or use the library regularly due to barriers to access.
- Programming Planning—Design library services and programs with barriers, expressed needs and interest in mind to ensure EVERYONE is being served.

- Realizing and being open about your organization strengths and weaknesses including limitations/restrictions—'Honesty is the best policy'
- Be available for partners not only when you need them but when they need you
- Be REAL
