Continuing Education Successful Training Sessions

For 2013, I've decided to intersperse articles on Continuing Education with articles that help guide library staff in providing quality training sessions for customers. The library's role in meeting user needs in learning situations isn't merely providing excellent database resources and reference assistance; we're also here to provide training on how to use library resources.

Adults attend library programs and training sessions because they want to learn. One of the main ideas that keeps arising in my personal research of User Instruction is that adults appear to do better when class agendas include andragogical (adult-oriented), heutogogical (self-directed) and collaborative methods. The formal one-way communication from teacher to student that we all remember from grade school isn't usually an effective method for imparting knowledge to adult students, because there's a paradigm shift from "receiving knowledge" to "exploring knowledge." Thus, desired goals are more often achieved when staff acts as moderators and encourage

directed exploration after providing initial/essential material (such as quick runthroughs or handouts) and then having a conversation when questions arise, or through encouraging student collaboration with students helping one another to learn concepts. <u>read more...</u>
