King County Archives: Archives, Art, and HipHop

Join King County Archives on Saturday, September 9, 2023, for Off The Wall, an annual graffiti art competition and community festival. The event is co-hosted with community non-profit 206Zulu, and it will be held in the Archives parking lot at 1215 E Fir St. Seattle, WA from 11:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m.

The event will feature a mural art competition coordinated by 206Zulu to refresh the graffiti art on the Archives building exterior. Archives staff will host tours of the building and the county's historical records. In addition, community cultural heritage institutions including Seattle Municipal Archives will be on-site so you can learn more about the history and culture of King County. Musical performances will be provided by DJs Able, Dyce, Lady Love, Neebor, ShoNuph and Zeta.

Established in 1990, King County Archives preserves and provides access to historically-relevant King County government records. The records in their care serve as a permanent source of information about activities, programs, and decisions of County agencies, elected officials, and County employees.

Established in 2010, Off the Wall spotlights the talented and diverse aerosol art community of the Pacific Northwest and abroad. The event is centered around the mural competition, where up to a dozen groups of four artists collaborate to create murals. In addition to the art competition, 206Zulu will celebrate a mural reveal at 13th & Fir Family Housing next door to the archives.


