Apply for a Position on the Library Council of Washington

Applications are currently being accepted for three Library Council of Washington positions. The positions are designed to represent these three different library constituencies in the state:

- Academic Libraries Two-Year Colleges
- Special Libraries Non-corporate
- Public Libraries under 100.000

The Library Council of Washington advises the State Librarian and the Office of the Secretary of State on statewide library issues and the expenditure of federal LSTA funding. Applications must be postmarked by Friday, October 21, 2016.

Members are chosen for a three-year term. A second three-year term is possible. The first three-year term for these positions will begin in January 2017. The first in-person meeting will be March 2017.

National Novel Writing Month (NaNoWriMo) is a nonprofit organization that believes your story matters. We host some of the largest writing events in the world, and we'd love it if you joined us to open your doors to writers in your community this November.

Come Write In is NaNoWriMo's community partnership program. Through it, we connect community spaces—like libraries, bookstores, and community centers—with local writers to build meaningful relationships with these writers and readers.

What does Come Write In offer you? Flexibility: Come Write In is built for flexibility. You can schedule specific times to have tables, chairs, and power outlets available to writers, or you can be open to drop-in writers at any time throughout November. Start with whatever works for you.

PLA Midwinter Institute Offers Strategies for Partnering with Law Enforcement to Advance Social Justice

The Public Library Association (PLA) is offering an interactive institute from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. on January 20, 2017 at the ALA Midwinter Meeting in Atlanta, Georgia. "Partnering with Law Enforcement to Advance Social Justice: A Train-the-Trainer Event for Public Libraries" will be presented by Andrea Blackman, division manager for the Special Collections Division of the Nashville (Tenn.) Public Library, and coordinator of the library's nationally recognized Civil Rights Room and Collection.

Using Nashville's groundbreaking civil rights training partnership with law enforcement agencies as an example, this institute will offer concrete strategies for how public libraries can use history as a gateway to discussing today's complex community dynamics in an environment that encourages open conversation and greater understanding.

At the conclusion of this institute, participants will:

- Redefine libraries in a new, innovative way;
- Align their library with what the community values most: education;
- Incorporate intuitive, value-enhancing words into their everyday lexicon;
- Heighten their library's visibility and stature; and
- Develop strategies that they can integrate immediately into their work.
