Making Headlines

Book It: Dolly Parton's Imagination Library

Dolly Parton has one of the most remarkable careers in the history of entertainment, with 46 Grammy nominations (the tenth most of any artist ever) and memberships in more than a dozen Halls of Fame. The 70-year-old icon—who landed at #13 on FORBES' 2016 Country Cash Kings list—has rarely taken a day off work in her 50-year music, TV and film career: the accomplished songwriter says she's written every day for almost six decades, penning more than 5,000 songs. With such a profound love of words, it's no surprise she says the moniker she's most proud to answer to might be the one she's least known for: "The Book Lady."

In 1995, Parton launched her <u>Imagination Library</u>, an initiative to help inspire every child in Sevier County, Tennessee, to learn to read. She designed an infrastructure to mail one free, hand-selected book per month to every child, from birth until age five, regardless of the family's income.

The Imagination Library was a quick success, and pre-school teachers in Tennessee cited its impact on young children's love of books. In 2000, Parton expanded the program across the United States, agreeing to help cover the administrative cost of sending books to children in any community that agreed to support the program. Local sponsors such as school systems, United Way and Rotary partner with Parton's foundation to cover the costs of the books and shipping. Now, any child living in a participating area under the age of five can enroll in the program at no cost. Read the full article here.

WSL Accepting Applications for Microsoft Imagine Academy 2016-2017 Grants

Applications are being accepted to fund Microsoft Imagine Academy projects for coding programs and Microsoft Office Specialist (MOS) certification. Eligible libraries may apply for up to \$4,500 per library system for equipment purchased by the State Library, and/or the funds to purchase equipment of the applicant library's choice. Funding for materials, promotional activities, and other activities which support project goals also may be requested.

The first review of applications will begin on Friday, August 2, 2016; applications received after August 2 will be reviewed and awarded on a funds-available basis as they are received.

This ALA 4-week eCourse begins September 12th

Are you involved in designing and facilitating library learning opportunities? Did you know of the multiple forms of library instruction? How about participating in a workshop that presents a unified framework to help you take an integrated approach to adapting different approaches to your overall learning programs?

The lecture as a learning tool is far from dead. There are numerous other models for facilitating learning that are gaining widespread and well-deserved attention in libraries and other learning organizations. This four-week hands-on eCourse, facilitated by training/learning specialist Paul Signorelli, will take you through a survey of Connected Learning, the Flipped Classroom model, connectivist MOOCs (massive open online courses), and innovations in learning spaces that support various approaches to learning in libraries.
