Microsoft Imagine Academy Lab Grants

Applications from Microsoft Imagine Academy program members are being accepted now through January 24, 2017 to receive equipment and limited funding to support new, or expand existing, coding programs and Microsoft certification. Laptops, 10-inch tablet computers, and routers purchased by the State Library are available (there is no limit to the quantity of each that can be requested; hardware technical specs are available in the Grant Guidelines), along with up to \$3000 per award to purchase equipment accessories like cases, tablet sleeves, keyboards, etc., or other materials and activities to support project activities.

- Lab Grant applications must be received by COB Tuesday, January 24, 2017, with contract execution expected before March 20, 2017.
- Grant materials (Guidelines and Application) are available on <u>the State</u> <u>Library's Grant page</u>.
- This Lab Grant opportunity replaces the Microsoft Imagine Academy 2016-2017 grant, which will close Tuesday, January 17, 2017.

The Gale Cengage Learning Financial Development Award recognizes an innovative, creative, well-organized project which successfully generated new income, in any amount, from alternative sources, such as individual gifts, foundations, endowments, "challenge" grants and related efforts. Academic, public and school libraries are eligible to apply. The winner receives a \$2,500 award and a 24k gold-framed citation.

Professional Development Scholarship from ALA Learning Round Table

The ALA Learning Round Table (LRT) will award up to \$1,000 to an individual to attend a professional development event between July 1, 2017 and June 30, 2018. The award

- Understand the utilize the general and courteous "rules of engagement" when composing or replying to emails
- Perform an audience analysis prior to writing
- Compose emails that clearly communicate desired action (e.g. approval, commitment, providing information, etc.)
- Recognize and stop inappropriate, emotional or harmful email thread
- Essential proofreading skills for tone, punctuation, and grammar

These free classes will be offered at four locations through the month of February and include identical morning and afternoon sessions.

Students take four courses on UW's Seattle campus, two in the first summer and two in the second, combined with four online courses during the school year.
