The Learning Curve

Social Justice Education Around Technology (SEAT): Critical Conversations Last year, two states - California and Washington - won a grant from the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation to address this issue. Open Data for Main Street has a team of librarians and open data advocates that has created a curriculum that libraries can use to help their communities find, use, and improve open data. They're looking for a diverse set of up to 20 libraries in California and Washington that would like to try the curriculum as a cohort this coming winter and help them improve it. They'll also provide a Train-the-Trainer for all beta testers in January 2018. Funding is available for a limited number of libraries that may need financial support to pilot the curriculum.
