Just before Thanksgiving, Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Chairman Pai <u>announced his plan</u> to roll back the 2015 Open Internet Order. This would do away with rules that limit the power of Internet Service Providers – like Verizon and Comcast – to slow websites, block mobile apps, or in any way control the information we access.

Digital Life Decoded: A User-Centered Approach to Cyber-Security and Privacy

The current technological and political landscapes have re-ignited conversations and concerns around digital security, privacy, and media literacy. To build a foundation for meaningful and sustainable programs that support the development of broad-based technological, media, and data literacies, a cross-departmental team of NCSU Librarians investigated what digital privacy means to students through user research and short-form pop-up programs branded as "Digital Life Decoded."

This 90-minute webinar will cover the process of development, including user research methods and project management. In addition to sharing methods and lesson learned, this webinar aims heighten the conversation about our professional and personal roles in leading cyber-security and privacy.
