The Fight for Library Funding

Last month, library advocates succeeded in convincing a record one-third of all Members of the House to sign the House versions of the [Library Services and Technology Act](#) (LSTA) and [Innovative Approaches to Libraries](#) (IAL) letters. To keep that momentum going, we need to collectively convince at least half of all Senators to do the same by May 19.

Given the president's proposal to eliminate the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and virtually all other library funding sources, the support of our senators is more important than ever before. Five minutes of your time could help preserve over \$210 million in library funding that's at serious risk.

Banned Book Week Grants

Each year the [Freedom to Read Foundation](#) (FTRF) distributes grants to non-profit organizations to support activities that raise awareness of intellectual freedom and censorship issues during the annual Banned Books Week celebration (September 24 – 30). Libraries, schools and universities are encouraged to apply. Grants are awarded at two levels, \$1,000 and \$2,500. To be eligible, organizations must not have been a recipient of an FTRF grant within the past five years. The deadline for applications is May 12.

Seattle Librarians Start Fake News Survival Class

The Seattle Public Library system has developed a class to arm patrons with the tools to weed out fake news. The "[Fake News Survival Guide](#)" has already sparked interest from the public and from libraries across the country.

"Our message is that we are here for you as a resource," said Di Zhang, reference librarian. "And in this confusing climate of fake news and fake information and scams and all these online hazards, you know you can come to us, and we can help you evaluate that information."

The first class launched Tuesday at the Central Library, but fellow librarians have expressed interest in teaching Zhang's curriculum.
