Washington's State Art Collection is now online at My Public Art Portal.

More than 2000 of the Collection's 4,500 artworks are included, and more is being added every week! The Portal includes current images of artworks, as well as interpretive text and data about the artwork, and brief biographies of the artists.

In conjunction with growing My Public Art Portal, this is the first time that a hands-on, physical inventory of the entire State Art Collection is being undertaken by the Washington State Arts Commission since its beginnings in 1975.
