

IMLS Is Accepting Nominations for the 2018 National Medal

Each year, the Institute of Museum and Library Services recognizes outstanding libraries and museums that have made significant contributions to improve the wellbeing of their communities. The winning museums and libraries are presented with the National Medal for Museum and Library Service, the nation's highest honor for community service.

IMLS is now accepting nominations for the 2018 awards. Anyone—an employee, a board member, a member of the public, or an elected official—can nominate an institution. To be considered, the institution must complete and return a nomination form by October 2.

Media Literacy @ Your Library Opportunity for Public Libraries

ALA, in collaboration with the Center for News Literacy at Stony Brook University, invites public libraries to apply for Media Literacy O Your Library, a pilot program that will train library workers to help their adult patrons become better news consumers.

In this six-month learning and prototyping project, ALA and the Center for News Literacy will work with teams from five public libraries to adapt existing media literacy training materials to serve the needs of public librarians and the communities they serve. "Rural Libraries in the United States: Recent Strides, Future Possibilities, and Meeting Community Needs" explores nuances of rurality, details challenges rural libraries face in maximizing their community impacts, and describes how existing collaborative regional and statewide efforts help rural libraries and their communities.

One-third of all U.S. public libraries serve areas with populations of 2,500 or fewer people, and this new report provides one of the most detailed looks at their services available to date.

The ALA Public Programs Office, the Association of College & Research Libraries (ACRL), and the National Coalition for Dialogue & Deliberation (NCDD) invite academic library professionals to attend a free learning series that teaches several dialogue facilitation approaches and helps librarians position themselves to foster conversation and lead change on their campuses and beyond.
