Superintendent Reykdal Submits Federal Education Plan

Superintendent of Public Instruction Chris Reykdal and the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI) submitted Washington's federal education plan to the U.S. Department of Education today.

The plan grants schools more flexibility over meeting the needs of every student and places an intentional focus on historically underserved populations of students.

"We want schools to look at the whole child," Reykdal said. "That includes providing supports that help our students succeed both inside and outside the classroom."

The Texas Library Association developed the Texas Library Recovery Connection, an online information sharing system to help connect those offering assistance to libraries in need.

Accepting Applications for WLA Graduate Study Scholarships

Earn Your CHIS Certificate for Free!

Your National Network of Libraries of Medicine Pacific Northwest Region (NNLM PNR) is alerting you to a wonderful opportunity for you to brush up on your health reference skills, evaluate your collection, and explore the health and wellness needs of your community!

A new federally-funded project is covering the costs for a cohort of public library librarians and staff to earn a Consumer Health Information Specialization certificate (CHIS) from the Medical Library Association (MLA). This is only for those who do not have CHIS. NNLM is recruiting members for a publiclibraries-only class of Health and Wellness @ the Library: The Essentials of Providing Consumer Health Services. The course will take 12 hours to complete and you will earn your CHIS certificate upon completion, which is good for three years. Banned Books Week: Report Censorship

Libraries, bookstores and schools will celebrate Banned Books Week, September 24 – 30, 2017, an opportunity to celebrate the power of words to open minds with new and diverse viewpoints, even those some people might find offensive. During the week thousands of libraries, bookstores, schools and theaters host dedicated events that focus on the dangers of censorship and celebrate the right to choose reading materials without restriction.

Are you aware of any banned or challenged books? Report them through ALA's <u>Challenge</u> Reporting tool.

Since 1990, the ALA Office for Intellectual Freedom has maintained a database on challenged materials. ALA collects information from two sources: media reports and reports submitted by individuals. Reports of challenges culled from media across the country are compiled in the Journal of Intellectual Freedom and Privacy; (subscriptions to JIFP include access to the archives of the Newsletter on Intellectual Freedom) those reports are then compiled in the Banned Books Week Resource Guide.

Think, Do, Show – Telling the Library Story with Data

Free Workshop on Geoscience Librarianship

"Geoscience Librarianship 101" – a full-day introduction to earth science information resources and their organization – will be presented by the Geoscience Information Society (GSIS) on Saturday, October 21 at the UW's Suzzallo Library in Seattle.
