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Making Headlines

A Major Victory for Washington's School Libraries

Last May, the <u>State of Washington Professional Educators</u>
<u>Standards Board</u> (PESB) <u>voted</u> to eliminate the requirement of taking coursework to become a school librarian. By eliminating Pathway 3, teachers only had to pass a test to complete their Library Media Endorsement (LME) certifications. The outcry was heard across Washington's library communities.

Alongside educators and library advocates, WLA lobbyist Carolyn Logue lent her voice to the outcry at the PESB meeting in Spokane on Friday, September 22. After receiving letters and hearing inperson testimonials, the Board has voted to reinstate the program requirement to become certified teacher-librarians.

Librarians from across the state testified that the extensive training provided by the programs helps ensure the teacher-librarian's ability to work across all subject matters and grade levels. In addition, they said digital citizenship and technology skills, coupled with the necessary resource management and administrative skills, were different enough from standard classroom teaching that a full program is warranted.

Maintaining these standards will ensure that those with the LME are truly the high-quality managers of school library information technology programs that our students, teachers, and districts need them to be.

On September 14, the full House of Representatives <u>voted not to make any cuts</u> in federal funding for the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS). This includes all funding for IMLS programs under the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA), and for the Department of Education's Innovative Approaches to Literacy (IAL) program. The National Network of Libraries of Medicine (NNLM) and the American Library Association have partnered through the Libraries Transform campaign and have created a <u>free health literacy toolkit</u>.

This toolkit equips library professionals with customizable tools to promote health literacy in October and throughout the year. It includes program ideas and downloadable marketing materials, such as bookmark templates, social media graphics, posters, table tents, and postcards.
