Advocacy Bootcamp at WLA Library Legislative Day

On February 28, the day before the <u>WLA Library Legislative Day</u> in Olympia, ALA will be hosting their <u>Advocacy Bootcamp</u>! Hear from Jamie LaRue (Director of the ALA Office for Intellectual Freedom & The Freedom to Read Foundation) and Marci Merola (Director of the ALA Office for Library Advocacy).

ALA's Advocacy Bootcamp urges attendees to re-think advocacy: to re-define the library community and expand the way we have been advocating for libraries. Advocacy Bootcamp will help library communities prepare to advocate for libraries as fundamental building blocks to democracy. In this joint effort of ALA's Office for Library Advocacy and the Office for Intellectual Freedom, we'll explore some of the brutal facts about our current environment, celebrate our assets, and offer practical tips to reclaim a moral sanction for the work we do, and the support our communities deserve.

Every April school librarians are encouraged to host activities to help their school and local community celebrate the essential role that strong school library programs play in transforming learning.

Screen Scene: Best Practices for Using Screen Media with Young Children

Screens are everywhere! Young children are spending more and more time engaged with screen media. Learn what and when children might be learning from screens as well as how we can support children's media activities. We will explore important cognitive advances children make during the first years of life that impact their ability to learn from screens. Finally, we will discuss the many practical applications and resources for parents and educators, and ways to make the most of ever-present media technology.

Upon completion of the training, participants will be able to (1) Summarize research-based understandings of the impact of digital engagement on early learning, (2) Apply an understanding of joint media engagement to their regular interactions with children in a library setting, and (3) Develop appropriate models of digital engagement for very young children.
