#### **Leap into Science Balance Workshops**

Spokane County Library is hosting an educator training on Leap into Science Balance Workshops, on Friday, May 11 Friday, May 11, 9:30am-2:30pm (lunch provided) at The Lab at North Spokane Library (44 E Hawthorne Rd, Spokane WA 99208).

Leap into Science is a nationwide program developed by The Franklin Institute Science Museum that integrates open-ended science activities with children's books, designed for children ages 3-10 and their families. The program empowers educators to offer workshops in community settings like libraries, museums, and out-of-school time programs to engage underserved audiences in accessible and familiar settings.

Organizations participating in Leap into Science will: Send a group of two or more educators (whenever possible) to a 4-hour of training on the high-quality science and literacy curriculum; Receive ongoing support and become a part of a Leap into Science National Network; Have access to the national Leap into Science leadership team and online resources; Participate in ongoing evaluation activities (i.e. surveys, interviews, site visits); and Receive one set of curriculum and materials kit per organization (valued at \$300)

Leap into Science is funded by National Science Foundation, and led by <u>The Franklin Institute</u> and <u>The National Girls Collaborative Project</u>.

**EdCamp Puget Sound** 

A: "My school library is an open space that allows for student independent use from before school to after school. Officially, we close at 3:30 on non-tutoring days. Pre-Charlotte (my now two-year-old daughter), I stayed open until students didn't need the resources and/or I needed to really get home. That is how I found myself at 5:30 PM helping a student cut and chop away at an essay, fill out a FAFSA, and apply for a full-ride scholarship as the pending 6:00 PM deadline was fast approaching. I had the resources, the knowledge, and time to help this young woman in one of her steps to earning that fullride scholarship. Except for toddler emergencies, I am likely to, purse and coat in hand, stop to help someone who asks or just looks like they need help."

Q: Why do school libraries matter?

A: "School libraries have the power to be an equalizer for students and school communities if allowed to be an open space that molds itself to the needs of the communities. Offering a space for any student to feel welcomed and valued. School libraries are concrete examples of how what we do, think, and say extends beyond the classroom day and walls."

Q: Fiction or non-fiction?

A: "Fiction."

Q: Smile or game face?


A: "Smile, I've never been one to buy the 'don't smile until Winter Break' mantra."

#### NEH Awards \$74,400 to Three Washington Projects

The National Endowment for the Humanities has announced \$18.6 million in grants for 199 humanities projects across the US. \$74,400 will go to three Washington projects:

- Washington State University will develop a mission-driven model for doctoral education.
- An independent scholar in Seattle will conduct fieldwork and documentation of Contemporary Cahto, a modern adaptation of a dormant Native American language of north-central California, with lexical data to be incorporated into the applicant's Cahto dictionary and reference grammar.
- Gonzaga University will research and write a chapter in a history of Jesuit missions to Native Americans in the American Northwest and Alaska from 1840 to 1940.

ALA released The State of America's Libraries report for 2018, an annual summary of library trends that outlines statistics and issues affecting all types of libraries. The report found that libraries continue to face challenges that carry with them the potential for censorship to a variety of books, programs, and materials. Overall in 2017, 416 books were targeted. The ALA Office for Intellectual Freedom has produced a list of "Top Ten Most Challenged Books" in 2017.
