 Award: Recognizes an individual or group for their efforts to defend, champion, support and/or educate others about Intellectual Freedom in Washington state.

- Superintendent of the Year Award: Recognizes a school superintendent who has demonstrated a noteworthy commitment to school libraries.

- Small District/Private School Administrator of the Year Award: Recognizes an administrator in a small or private school who has demonstrated a noteworthy commitment to school libraries.
- Supervisor of the Year Award: Recognizes a library supervisor who has demonstrated a notable commitment to school libraries.
- CAYAS Visionary Service Award: Recognizes an individual who, through practice and example, provides inspiration and leadership for others who serve children and young adults in libraries.
- WALE Outstanding Employee Award: Recognizes a member of WALE who has made significant contributions to or accomplishments in a library or support staff organization.
- Emeritus Membership(s): Recognizes an outstanding WLA member who has retired from library service prior to the annual conference.
- Honorary Membership(s): Recognizes an individual who has supported libraries who is not a library staff member by profession.
