The House and Senate Appropriations Committees have now passed fiscal year (FY) 2019 funding bills which provide level funding for Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) and Innovative Approaches to Literacy (IAL). We're nearly there in terms of securing funding for these and many other programs that help libraries better serve our communities – but we're not quite at the finish line. The FY 2019 funding bills now head to the full House and Senate.

One of the best ways to ensure full funding is to express our thanks to the elected leaders who have supported libraries. As Washington's Representative Herrera Beutler and Senator Murray serve on the House and/or Senate Labor-HHS-Education Subcommittee of the Appropriations Committee, your "thank you" can be doubly powerful right now.

Would you take a moment to thank your senator(s) and/or representative for their support of libraries with a call, tweet, letter, or letter to the editor expressing thanks on behalf of your community? You can reach congressional offices by visiting their websites or calling 202-225-3121 for the House and 202-224-3121 for the Senate.

Use your legislator's social media handles (@HerreraBeutler and @PattyMurray) to tweet at them a message such as "thank you Rep.Herrera Beutler/Sen. Murray for supporting federal funding for libraries – it helps our library [do x, y, z]." Using original photos from your library provides an added personal touch.

Alki: What No One Ever Tells You About Working in Libraries



We're thrilled to announce two more keynote speakers at the **2018 WLA Conference**: Mitali Perkins and Dan Gemeinhart!

Mitali Perkins will host the annual CAYAS Author Breakfast. Mitali has written ten novels for young readers, including You Bring the Distant Near (nominated for the National Book Award, Walter Award honor book), Rickshaw Girl (chosen by the New York Public Library as one of the top 100 books for children in the past 100 years), Bamboo People (American Library Association's Top Ten Novels for Young Adults), and *Tiger Boy* (winner of the Charlotte Huck Honor Award and the South Asia Book Award). She has been honored as a "Most Engaging Author" by independent booksellers across the country and selected as a "Literary Light for Children" by the Associates of the Boston Public Library. Mitali was born in Kolkata, India, before immigrating to the United States. She has lived in Bangladesh, India, England, Thailand, Mexico, Cameroon, and Ghana, studied at Stanford and U.C. Berkeley, and currently resides in the San Francisco Bay Area.

Dan Gemeinhart will be our keynote for the Saturday lunch. Dan lives in a small town smack dab in the middle of Washington state with his wife and three young daughters. He was lucky and grateful to be a teacher-librarian in an elementary school for fourteen years, where he got to share awesome books with awesome kids. Dan has written five middle grade novels: Scar Island, The Honest Truth, Some Kind of Courage, Good Dog, and the upcoming The Remarkable Journey of Coyote Sunrise.

Cultural Competence: Addressing Race Relations in 21st Century

The Washington State Library has just opened registration for a new training being offered this fall. Sessions are in Lynnwood, Tacoma, Spokane and Issaquah.

This session helps to develop participants' appreciation of their role in becoming culturally competent by: 1) providing a framework on how to address issues of equity and race; 2) creating common language for entering into discourse; 3) increasing ones understanding of diverse experiences and perspectives; and 4) developing tools for engaging across cultures. This framework considers the importance of deepening awareness of selfmoving from color blindness to racial cognizance; increasing knowledge of others and their experiences of racism and oppression; developing skills to work effectively across cultures; and advocating and taking action to initiate change. Participants are taught these four components of cultural competence through lecture and small and large group discussion. Prior culturally relevant professional development is brought into context and understanding of diverse perspectives is explored.

Korczak Conference 2018: The Human Library Approach

Don't miss a unique opportunity to spend the whole day, August 25, with teachers, teacher-librarians, principals, school counselors, social workers, psychologists, and child advocates on the Seattle Pacific University campus to learn more about the pedagogy of Janusz Korczak and receive insights and handouts to use in your classrooms. The cost of the workshop is \$10, and it includes lunch and 8 clock hours.

This workshop is a part of the Korczak Conference 2018, August 22-25, an international conference hosted by the School of Education at Seattle Pacific University and the Janusz Korczak Association of the USA. It celebrates the life and work of Janusz Korczak (pronounced Kor-chak), a pediatrician, writer, and educator who strongly advocated for children's rights and directed Jewish and Christian orphanages, which he turned into safe havens for teenagers and young adults.

State Board of Education Survey to Inform New Strategic Plan

The Washington State Board of Education is asking for feedback in **this short survey** about the hopes and dreams you have for all

Developed by The Franklin Institute, Leap into Science is a nationwide program that integrates open-ended science activities with children's books, designed for children ages 3-10 and their families. The program empowers educators to offer programs in community settings like libraries, museums, and out-of-school time programs to engage underserved audiences in accessible and familiar settings.

This evidence-based program will be made available through in-person trainings. The free trainings will take place in Everett at the Imagine Academy on September 19 and at the Auburn branch of the King County Library on September 25. Balance is the focus of these workshops. Those who sign up for these workshops will receive a free kit with all the necessary resources to replicate these programs.

The ALA Office for Diversity, Literacy, and Outreach Services (ODLOS) announced a travel grant for the third national Joint Conference of Librarian of Color. This year's conference centers around the theme "Gathering all Peoples: Embracing Culture & Community" and will take place from September 26-30, 2018, in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

ODLOS encourages all interested parties to apply for one of two grants. This \$1,000 grant can be used for travel, housing, and registration for the conference and will close on August 13. All applicants must answer two essay questions related to the conference and the two winners will be invited to write a blog post on their experience.
