### Deadline Extended: WLA Scholarships

The deadline to apply for WLA professional development scholarships has been extended to August 1, 2018. Winners will be announced September 4.

Do you know anyone who could use some help funding their degree, certificate, continuing education, or conference attendance? This year, the WLA Professional Development Committee is offering five scholarships for library staff and students at any stage of their careers.

Maryan E. Reynolds Scholarship: \$1000 - \$3000 to one or more WLA members who is enrolled in an ALA-accredited Masters degree program and has completed at least one semester or quarter.

Hahn-Ahlers Continuing Education Scholarship: \$1000 to a WLA member toward a degree, certificate, or graduate-level study in the Library or Education fields.

John Stanford Continuing Education Scholarship: \$1000 to a current WLA member of color toward a degree, certificate, or graduate level study in the Library or Education fields.

**Denny Bond Library Paraprofessional Scholarship:** \$500 or \$1000 to a current school library paraprofessional and WLA member toward participation at a local or national library-related conference, workshop, or educational event. Sponsored by the WLA School Library Division.

As of 2016, more than 43 million immigrants were living in the US, and that number is growing. Immigration can breathe new life into the local economy as young workers replace retiring baby boomers, open new businesses, and become active consumers. Libraries can ease immigrants' transition into the community by acting as a resource hub. Asset mapping encourages libraries to go out into their communities and uncover and assess the resources available to immigrants. The information they gather gives the insight

# Kitsap Regional Library Accepts Award for Library PR

On Sunday, Kitsap Regional accepted their second John Cotton Dana Award at ALA Annual in New Orleans. The award honors outstanding effective strategic communication campaigns that show results. Winners receive a \$10,000 cash development grant from the H.W. Wilson Foundation.

According to the announcement from ALA, "Kitsap Regional faced a challenge that many libraries face today: decreasing financial resources. In 2007 and 2010, Kitsap asked its region and local community to support libraries by voting on a tax levy. Both years the voters said no. Kitsap didn't quit, they planned. Using a five-year plan, shifting the culture of the library and brand, reconnecting to the community and customers, Kitsap was ready in 2016 to ask voters to support their libraries one more time. The hard work and planning resulted in a yes vote with 65-percent support. Kitsap's community has definitely become superfans of their Library."

### **Letter to Washington Principals**

Last week, the WLA Board sent a letter to the Association of Washington School Principals (AWSP) to urge principals to work with their school librarians to ensure efficient and adequate planning for dollars to be spent in the library, following the signing of SB 6362 last March. This letter was sent to all Washington superintendents earlier this month.
