MLSA Call Needed to Senator Murray's Office

Below is a message from the American Library Association's Washington Office.

We learned Monday that the Museum and Library Services Act (S. 3530) may be considered by the HELP committee during the Lame Duck session starting right after the Thanksgiving break, and we need to ensure MLSA is on their agenda. As you know, this legislation would reauthorize the Institute of Museum and Library Services as well as the Library Services and Technology Act. It is vital that Senators on the committee hear from library leaders TODAY about the importance of passage of S. 3530.

Please contact Senator Murray with the following message:

- The library community in your state strong supports S. 3530 and its improvements;
- It is vital that the Senate HELP Committee passes S.
 3530 during the lame duck session;
- Reauthorization of IMLS will allow libraries to continue to provide services to veterans, entrepreneurs, children, families, rural and under-served communities;
- S. 3530 has bipartisan support in the Senate and is strongly supported by the library community across the U.S.;
- Please request that the HELP Committee Marks Up S. 3530.

Because of the short time period, a phone call to Senator Murray (202-224-2621) would be helpful. (Washington received \$3,490,908 from IMLS in 2018.)

The Essentials of Marketing Your Interlibrary Loan Service

Marketing interlibrary loan can teach patrons how to use the service more effectively and can introduce new users to the service. But currently, there is very little literature on the subject. Marketing other library services is written about frequently but ILL, not so much. It becomes hard to know how to approach marketing ILL when there is not a lot of precedent for it. So how do you begin your own interlibrary loan marketing campaign? In this PNR Rendezvous presentation you will learn what marketing really is, about libraries that have successfully marketed interlibrary loan, and lessons learned from those marketing endeavors. MakeCode Training from WSL

At the forums, Reykdal will outline his vision for transforming K–12 education and the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction's (OSPI) budget priorities for the upcoming legislative session. There will also be time for a moderated question and answer period with the audience.

Each forum will begin with opening remarks by the local school district superintendent. Following their remarks, Reykdal will speak about OSPI's 2019–21 budget proposal, which aims to close opportunity gaps by increasing spending on comprehensive supports, pathways to graduation, and creating a new model for funding elementary school buildings, among other things.

The forum will close with a question and answer session with Reykdal, moderated by a local reporter or community member. Each forum will be about 90-minutes long.

California Libraries in Wildfires' Wake

Public institutions across the country are rallying in support of displaced library employees and libraries devastated by wildfires in California that have claimed more than 60 lives and resulted in the evacuation of tens of thousands people.

"Miraculously, the Paradise branch of the Butte County Library system is still standing," says Butte County Library Director Melanie Lightbody, noting that it's one of the only remaining structures in the town.

The remaining five branches in the system are still operational and have become information centers, offering computers, Wi-Fi, and printers to help displaced residents contact insurance companies, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), and other agencies. **Read more** from ALA.

The Shapeshifting Book: From Clay Tablet, to Paper, to Touchscreen

The book has taken many shapes in the five millennia over which humans have sought to record information—varying with the needs of writers and readers and with materials available for production. This **Pub Talk** from the University of Washington Bothell will feature a performance and lecture by a scholar and artist that will unpack the ways books have always been dynamic, interactive experiences, whether their interface looks like a tablet or a touchscreen.
