KCLS Foundation awarded \$80,000 Boeing Grant for KCLS to Expand STEAM Education

The King County Library System Foundation (KCLSF) has been awarded an \$80,000 grant from the Boeing Company to help KCLS expand STEAM education, with the aim of increasing access to technology and 21st-century workplace skills for thousands of low-income and underserved families.

The Boeing grant will enable KCLS to broaden the size of its ideaX program, which offers free hands-on STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art/Design and Math) activities that inspire people to explore creativity and

Free Online PD in Digital Local History for Public Librarians

Do you want to gain skills to use digital history sources and develop local history projects that will open up new programming opportunities? Do you want to help your patrons connect their interest in genealogy to broader social, cultural, and political history?

Creating Local Linkages is a free online professional development resource for public
