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MAKING HEADLINES

Pierce County Library System Wins Funding

Voters said yes to restore the Pierce County Library System's funding. In the November 6 general election, the majority of voters approved a levy lid lift with a 50.21 percent approval rate, with 106,844 voters casting yes votes.

"We are incredibly grateful to voters for believing in their public library," said Pierce County Library Executive Director Georgia Lomax. "This is a positive endorsement for the value the Library System brings to our communities. We thank the voters for their investment in the Library System."

The restored levy will maintain library services and return the Library's levy rate to its full legal amount of 50 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property value. This would be an increase of approximately 10 cents per \$1,000 of assessed property. The restored levy takes effect in 2019.

Senate Committee Approves Libraries Bill

On Thursday, the U.S. Senate Health, Education, Labor and Pensions Committee voted unanimously to send the Museum and Library Services Act to the Senate floor. The bill would reauthorize the Institute of Museum and Library Services.



This new funding opportunity is designed specifically to strengthen the ability of small and rural libraries, archives, and related organizations to serve their communities, and awards sizes range from \$10,000 to \$50,000.

Holiday Book Flood at the Nordic Museum



Iceland—one of Europe's most literate and literary countries—is home to many delightful holiday traditions, including Jólabókaflóð - or, Holiday Book Flood. Prior to the Jule shopping season, Icelandic publishers release a flood of new books. Among newly knitted sweaters and licorice candies, Icelanders invariably find a new book (or several) under the holiday tree. The Christmas break is spent hanging out with family, devouring the latest crime novel, trollish misadventure, or expertly crafted poetry.

This year, the Seattle-Reykjavik Sister City Association (SRSCA)—in partnership with the Nordic Museum—brings this holiday tradition to Seattle. The Holiday Book Flood starts December 1 and continues through December 9, with a pop-up shop at the Nordic Museum gift store, highlighting the best in Icelandic and Nordic literature, curated by the SRSCA Book Club and Fantagraphics Books.

On December 6, the Flood kicks into high gear with a reading featuring local literary talent, at the Nordic Museum, between 6:00 – 8:00 pm.

Oral History Competition for Grades 9-12

Students throughout Washington in grades 9-12 are invited to enter a statewide oral history competition to complement the new exhibit 1968: The Year that Rocked Washington by Legacy Washington, a program of the Office of the Secretary of State.

The competition will open January 1 and run until April 30, with finalists invited to a reception in June. Entries are to consist of a 4-to 10-page written profile or essay, based on interviews and research, telling the story of a person who experienced the tumult of 1968. Winning works will be published online by the Office of Secretary of State. Legacy Washington invites educators to participate in this special event by sharing it with their classrooms. Free Online PD in Digital Local History for Public Librarians

Do you want to gain skills to use digital history sources and develop local history projects that will open up new programming opportunities? Do you want to help your patrons connect their interest in genealogy to broader social, cultural, and political history?

Creating Local Linkages is a free online professional development resource for public librarians developed by historians at the George Mason University's Roy Rosenzweig Center for History & New Media. Using these skills, librarians can create new and enhance existing community programs, develop digital local history exhibits using library collections, and help patrons conducting genealogical research to contextualize their family histories.
