## Bellingham Public Library Appoints New Director

The Bellingham Public Library Board of Trustees announced last week the appointment of Rebecca Judd as the new director of the Bellingham Public Library. Judd, who currently lives on Bainbridge Island and works for Kitsap Regional Library, will begin July 16.

#### **Students Protest School Librarian Cuts**

In April, the Monroe School District announced that certified Teacher Librarian positions would be replaced by part-time Digital Learning Teacher positions. Led by fifth-grader Jakari Singleton, a group of student protesters calling themselves the "Picket Fence Group" has been protesting the changes outside of Fryelands Elementary School.

The American Library Association (ALA) sent a letter to Monroe School District to ask them to reconsider the removal of certified teacher librarians. WLA President Craig Seasholes read the letter aloud at their Board of Education meeting last week.

Last March, Governor Jay Inslee signed SB 6362, which improves on the McCleary school funding plan that the Washington Legislature approved last year. WLA worked hard to get a line item added to the bill that allocates \$20 per student for "school library materials."

The line item is an allocation, not a mandate. The WLA Board **sent a letter** to all superintendents in Washington to urge them to work with their school librarians to ensure efficient and adequate planning for dollars to be spent in the library. Our hope is that when the 2019 MSOC reports go to the school boards, districts will have clearly outlined spending for libraries to show how these dollars are improving student success.
