# Webinar: Working Across Difference: Making Better Connections

While we "know" our co-workers, we often struggle to understand the cultural nuances of dealing with people of different cultural backgrounds, religions, languages, sexual orientations, gender expressions,

- Toppenish Library, Yakima Valley Libraries: There are stories of paranormal activity on the second floor, which is kept locked from patrons. A man and women have been seen looking out of the second-story windows.

- Tacoma Public Library, Wheelock Branch: Maintenance workers have reported strange disturbances, and one person saw an apparition of a grayhaired woman believed to be Anna McCormick, the library's founder.
- Centennial Middle School, West Valley School District: Students have reportedly witnessed a woman with no legs floating around in the old library.
- Anacortes Museum: The museum, located in the old Carnegie library, has had reports of cold spots and disembodied footsteps, as well as the apparition of a former librarian.
