The **2019 OLA-WLA Conference** is almost upon us! There is still time to **register** for the conference or to add a **preconference** to an Under cooperative agreement with the U.S. National Library of Medicine and in partnership with the National Institutes of Health *All of Us* Research Program, the NNLM PNR is pleased to announce two new funding opportunities: the NNLM *All of Us* Community Engagement Award for up to \$100,000; and the NNLM *All of Us* Health Literacy Outreach Award for up to \$19,000. These opportunities will support outreach projects to increase health literacy and community engagement about health, and increase awareness of the NIH *All of Us* Research Program.
