Political Reference Services: What Every
Adult & Youth Librarian Should Know

Civic engagement is low, which is problematic for Democracy. Often it is because citizens (including library staff!) are mystified about the basics of politics and fundamental advocacy skills and opportunities—of which there are SO many. Libraries should be the focal point for gaining this knowledge. This hands-on workshop covers fundamental skills for adult and youth librarians, such as how to find and track bills, how to know who is giving money to campaigns, and how to make your voice heard by the government—in short, how to advocate for yourself and your community.
