

ARSL Conference: Scholarships Available for Small and Rural Library Workers

The Washington State Library will fund two scholarships to the Association of Rural and Small Libraries (ARSL) 2019 Conference in Burlington, Vermont. This conference has sold out, so this may your chance to attend!

Preference will be given to applicants who have not won this scholarship before. The value of the scholarship is approximately \$2,000. The scholarship will fund travel, lodging, and conference registration. ARSL Conference dates are September 4-7, 2019. Apply by May 31.

Eligibility requirements:

- Applicants must be from a public or tribal library or library branch serving a population of 10,000 or less in Washington State.
- Scholarship awardees must commit to a doing follow-up project.

Webinar: Is That Real? A Crash Course in Verifying Online Content

Dive into the tools and skills that you and your patrons need to verify the authenticity of usergenerated content, and learn how to create engaging fact-checking investigations that will empower learners to detect and debunk misinformation online. News Literacy Project (NLP) covers topics such as developing keen observation skills that help detect images circulating in a false context; using reverse image searches to find the origins of a digital image; using webpage archivers to explore deleted or changed content; and using Google Street View to explore and confirm details of locations around the world. This webinar will help you boost your own skills and give you confidence to help patrons evaluate their sources, too.

Northwest Interlibrary Loan & Resource Sharing Conference

Successful Legislative Session for Washington Libraries

The Senate's 41-7 vote Thursday to pass House Bill 2015, which cleared the House 92-5 on April 9, moves Washington forward on the much-needed project for a new library-archives building for Washington state. This legislation, which now awaits Governor Inslee's signature, authorizes the Office of Secretary of State to charge an additional \$2 for recording documents with counties, an increase that will revert back once the building is paid off.
