WLA Annual Conference is Going Virtual!



The Conference Committee has made the difficult decision to hold the 2020 WLA Conference online. While we were looking forward to coming together in Spokane this October, the health and safety of our communities and the accessibility of the conference are our top priorities. We know many members are facing budget cuts and travel restrictions, and the online format allows the conference to remain accessible. Costs for moving the conference online are currently being evaluated. We anticipate that registration for the virtual event will be significantly lower than the originally planned rate. This information will be shared and posted on our website once the decision has been made. We hope to reach library professionals who may have never had the opportunity to attend a WLA conference.

You can look forward to a schedule packed full of engaging keynotes, sessions and workshops, networking opportunities, and exhibitors at #WLA2020. We're reviewing our options for timing and format, and more information will be released by the end of June. Conference dates will be in October, and registration will open mid-July. Information about sponsoring and exhibiting will be available soon. If you are presenting a program at the conference, we will be in touch with more information by the end of the month.

The conference theme is 2020 Vision: Looking to the Future. #### WLA Statement on Anti-Racism

The Washington Library Association decries the brutality Black communities experience from those charged to protect and serve. Libraries are providers of vital resources for historically underserved communities, and this work has never been more important than it is now. We are responsible for continuing to do this difficult, sometimes painful work that demands we address our biases and how they impact our ability to serve our communities equitably. We urge library professionals across Washington to fight for Black lives, actively oppose systemic oppression and police brutality, and prioritize anti-racism in all that we do. The WLA Board is committed to doing this anti-racist work within our association. To be silent is to be complicit.

The Urban Libraries Council has also released a poignant statement on race and social equity, which serves as a baseline for libraries to build policies and actions designed to make their communities more inclusive and just. The statement has been signed by 163 public libraries across North America. Learn more here.

## Back to School? Broadband Solutions for Online Learning

"Back to school" will not mean "back to normal" this fall. Almost every school system is making plans for a hybrid teaching model that includes significant online learning from home. Unfortunately, in some school districts, 20 to 30 percent of students do not have broadband at home, which poses a significant barrier to educational opportunity. Many school systems are struggling to address this broadband learning gap - some are providing hot spots and devices, others are upgrading their school broadband networks, while still others are exploring innovative options to provide their own wireless broadband services. SHLB's upcoming webinar explores how K-12 schools can prepare to meet the broadband challenges and needs of back-toschool during COVID-19.
