### Welcome New Washington State Librarian: Sara Jones

The Washington State Library is excited to announce Sara Jones has been selected as the new Washington State Librarian. Jones will begin mid-February after serving as the director of the Marin County Free Library since July 2013. Prior to her time in California, Jones held positions in Nevada libraries for 25 years, including serving as the Carson City Library Director, the Elko-Lander-Eureka County Library System Director and Youth Services Coordinator, and Nevada State Librarian and Administrator of the State Library and Archives from 2000-2007.

Jones was named the Nevada Library Association's Librarian of the Year in 2012; served as Nevada's American Library Association (ALA) Council Delegate for four years; coordinated ALA National Library Legislative Day for Nevada for 12 years; served as the Nevada Library Association president; was an active member of the Western Council of State Libraries serving as both vice president and president; and served on the University of North Texas Department of Library and Information Sciences Board of Advisors for over 10 years. She was awarded the ALA Sullivan award for services to children in 2018. She is currently the president of CALIFA, a nonprofit library membership consortium.

## **Exterior Connectivity Project Grant Opportunity**

<u>Washington State Library</u> has launched the new <u>Exterior Connectivity</u> <u>Project</u> grant award to help public libraries and tribes standardize and extend WiFi connectivity. This opportunity is part of <u>CARES Act funding</u> provided by the <u>Institute of Museum and Library Services</u> to WSL.

<u>Apply online</u>. WSL will review applications and make awards on a weekly basis as long as funding is available.

This exterior WiFi should provide connectivity beyond building walls and regular hours of operation. This grant opportunity seeks to enable libraries to increase their coverage and build stronger networks for patrons. WSL will reimburse 50 percent of the agreed upon allowed expenses per site completed in each project. A project may cover exterior connectivity for multiple locations.
