The application for WLA scholarships is now open. Applications are due Friday, July 9. Learn more about WLA scholarships and apply.



Partners will receive training and resources to implement NASA events and programming, access to a university subject matter expert (SME) to support patron engagement, and a \$1,600 programming stipend to purchase materials for NASA STEAM activities and/or support presentations by local NASA-funded SMEs.
