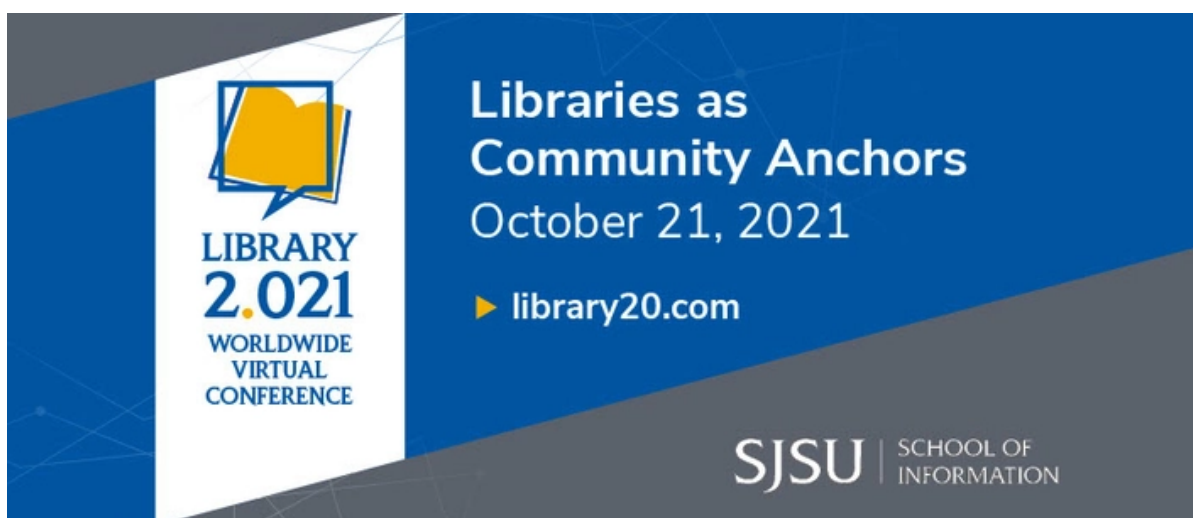

Applications Open for ALA Scholarships

Scholarship funds are now available from the American Library Association (ALA). ALA has more than \$300,000 available to students who are studying in library science or school library media programs at the master's degree level. Get your application in early. The deadline to apply is March 1, 2022.

Scholarships range from \$2,500 to \$8,000 per student per year. They include scholarships for students interested in children's librarianship, public librarianship, youth librarianship, federal librarianship, new media, and library automation. In addition, there are scholarships available for minorities, persons with disabilities, and people who are already employed in libraries but do not have an MLS.

To be considered for one of these scholarships, applicants must attend a master's level program in library and information science that has been accredited by the ALA. [Learn more and start your application.](#)

ArtsWA is specifically looking for organizations and arts teachers, dance instructors, musicians, and other performers who have provided arts programming to older adults outside of the Seattle area.

Request for Proposals: Digital Navigator Grant Program

The [Washington State Department of Commerce](#) is soliciting proposals (RFP NO. WSBO 21-003) from firms interested in providing Digital Navigator services to communities statewide. Digital Navigators provide technical assistance and expertise in internet connectivity and devices and the digital skills to use them.

Digital Navigator services, devices and subscriptions must involve one-on-one culturally literate assistance for people with limited access to services including individuals seeking work, families supporting students, English language learners, people experiencing poverty, senior citizens and Medicaid recipients.

The [Washington State Broadband Office](#) anticipates awarding grants ranging between \$500,000 and \$2,000,000 per proposal.

Data Services Specialization Certificate and NNLM Region 5 Application Fee Sponsorship

The [Medical Library Association](#) (MLA) is offering library workers the opportunity to obtain the Data Services Specialization (DSS) certificate to demonstrate their attainment of the relevant knowledge and skills necessary to provide data services.

Best geared for health sciences librarians and information professionals, and built upon the MLA Data Services Competency, the Basic Certification requires the completion of four 4-credit free Network of the National Library of Medicine (NNLM) courses and are available on demand. An additional three credits in the five skill areas are required, and several NNLM courses are listed on the [NNLM Data Services Specialization page](#).

Survey: "What Kind of 'CRAAP' Do They Teach in High School?"

Consider participating in the following information literacy practices survey created by librarians at Bellevue College.

With the help of participants, the survey organizers hope to identify what (if any) types of source evaluation (CRAAP, SIFT, lateral reading, etc.) are being taught in Washington state middle schools and high schools. The results of this survey will allow them to determine how best to incorporate source evaluation and information literacy practices into our work, and create continuity in learning for our students.

Emails provided will be used to alert participants of survey progress and results, and may be added to a directory of library professionals in the state for future collaborations. **Emails/personal information will be removed from the raw data, and will NOT be used for publication purposes or presentations.**

The survey will be open until Nov. 1, 2021. The results of this survey will be analyzed and shared as a final report, and may be used in future presentations or publications.
