
Submit a Social Media Takeover from Your Library!

Apply for New Round of ALA Emergency Relief Grants

The American Library Association (ALA) has announced it will make available \$1.55M in emergency relief grants to more than 75 libraries that have experienced substantial economic hardship due to the coronavirus pandemic.

The ALA COVID Library Relief Fund invites public, school, academic, tribal, and correctional libraries across the United States and US Territories to <u>apply for grants</u> of \$20,000, through April 21.

Niche Academy: "Universal Design for Learning: Review, Assessment, and Future Directions"
