Youth Services Critical Conversations Club: Autism-Ready Libraries

The Washington State Library and Autism-Ready Libraries Project Team invite you to the next <u>Youth Services Critical Conversations Club</u> (YSC3) on May 12 from 10-11 a.m. <u>Register here</u>.

<u>Autism-Ready Libraries</u> is a research project funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) and led by the University of Washington Information School to build public libraries' capacity to provide early literacy programs, resources, and services for autistic children and their families in the public library. Its main focus is on supporting youth-services staff to serve the early literacy needs of this population. To do this, the project team is developing an Autism-Ready Libraries Toolkit (ARLT). Once fully developed, this toolkit will include training, tools, and a variety of resources to empower library youth services providers to serve autistic children and their family's early literacy needs.

Join Autism-Ready Library to hear more about the research that is informing the ARLT, and for a first look at their initial findings, including barriers that keep families with autistic children out of libraries, and best practices these families have identified to support their library use.

This program is supported by funding provided by the federal Institute of Museum and Library Services administered by the Library Services and Technology Act, through the Washington State Library, a division of the Office of the Secretary of State.
