


Attend the 9th Annual Virtual LILi Conference

Call for Proposals: Beyond the Numbers 2022

The <u>Conference Organizing Committee of the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis</u> seeks proposals for 5-minute lighting talks, 20-minute sessions, and 45-minute sessions, panels, or workshops for its biennial conference on economic information. The conference will take place in-person November 8-10, 2022.

This conference will bring together librarians, information professionals, data researchers, and data managers to improve understanding of economic resources and how to find, use, and share them.

Possible topics include, but are not limited to:

- Managing data for access, preservation, sharing, and re-use
- Library instruction using economic data: case studies, best practices

Call for Papers: The Future of Peer-led Research Services: *Reference Services Review* Special Issue

The COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted traditional service models in academic libraries. However, out of those disruptions emerged innovation, reconceptualization, and shifts in how and who delivers front-line services. Often out of necessity, libraries and information organizations have increasingly turned to student employees to maintain critical service points in physical and virtual spaces. This special issue of *Reference Services Review* (RSR) will explore how peer-led research services have evolved and what opportunities the future may hold for peer research support.

RSR seeks articles for Volume 51 Issue 2 – a special issue on peer-led research services. Topics may include innovations in program development or justification, training and onboarding, analysis of the day-to-day management, assessment, and evaluation, and forecasting of how these programs may continue to evolve. Peer-led research services may occur at many levels and in many contexts, including, but not limited to in-person, virtual, or hybrid research services; undergraduate or graduate levels; work-study programs or specially-funded internships/positions; general or specialized research support; and general or special collections.

Distinct types of papers are welcome for submission, including the following -

Research

- Empirical studies, quantitative studies, qualitative studies, mixed-methods, and multimethods
- Broad studies of multiple programs/initiatives that have proven successful in both in-person, remote, and/or hybrid environments

Longitudinal studies

• Studies that explore the design, implementation, and impact of student-led peer research programs

Viewpoint or conceptual paper

- Reflections on key terms and core concepts, i.e., the history of peer-led research programs and their development
- Reflections on the transition from librarian-led to peer-led research support
- Reflections on improving engagement by creating a peer-supported environment

Case study

- Studies that explore the transition to peer-led research support service models
- Studies that focus on practices toward training, onboarding, and providing professional formation to student consultants
- Studies that focus on advancing diversity, equity, inclusion, and anti-racism through peer-led support services
- Studies that focus on the assessment of peer-led support service models
- Studies that focus on peer-led information literacy training
- Studies that focus on the work that library/archive associations and/or library consortia are doing in this space
- Studies that focus on professional formation, and specifically on the work library staff are doing to support the growth of student employees

Literature review

- Annotation and/or critique of the literature on practices for peer-led research services
 - Annotation and/or critique of peer-led research service models either in-person, virtual synchronous, or virtual asynchronous
 - Overview or examination of ongoing mentoring for student consultants within professional development opportunities

 - 4 WA Stories Fund Grants will be awarded in 2022. Online applications are due July 15 and notification is Sept. 1. Funded activity may begin after Oct.1.

The first consideration deadline for the <u>Network of the National Library of Medicine (NNLM) Region 5</u> Data Engagement Awards and Outreach & Engagement Awards is next week, by **5:00 p.m. PT on Tuesday, June 28**.

These awards are for those in Region 5 which includes Alaska, California, Hawaii, Nevada, Oregon, Washington, and the U.S. Territories and Freely Associated States in the Pacific.

- At minimum, three <u>Data Engagement Awards</u> for up to \$25,000 each will be funded to support engagement in data literacy, data science or data management, such as through projects that support biomedical and research data services; help train the healthcare, library or educator workforce to access, understand, and use data; or create diverse community connections to further educate a wide audience on data literacy and management best practices.
- Additionally, at least three <u>Outreach & Engagement Awards</u> for up to \$25,000 each will be funded to improve health literacy and increase health equity through engagement and training for health information, digital literacy skills, and access to trusted health information in underresourced communities. The award also supports the purchase of technology needed to advance connectivity.

WSL: Self-Guided Teacher-Librarian Core Curriculum

The Washington State Library (WSL) has released a <u>Teacher-Librarian Core</u> <u>Curriculum</u> on Niche Academy!

The course is designed for new school library workers, school library workers who haven't been formally trained, aspiring school library workers, or anyone who would like a refresher in the core knowledge needed to run a successful library program in a school. The course is self-guided and takes participants through four modules: Collection Management, Information Literacy & Digital Citizenship, School Library Programming, and School Library Partnerships.

Completing all of the modules will give participants a total of 16 clock hours. In order to receive clock hours for the course, <u>registration is required</u>.

Before beginning the course, participants must read the module "READ FIRST: Course Registration and Clock Hours Info," which covers course objectives, NBPTS Library Media standards, and how to receive clock hours. Participants will also need to create a Niche Academy account, if they have not already done so, and request access to the learning pathway.

Please note, WSL is also in the planning stages of organizing cohorts to go through the material in this course as group. The cohort will be implemented sometime in the 2022/2023 school year. Please stay tuned for more information!
