#### WA Books, Authors for National Festival

<u>Washington Center for the Book</u> has selected one youth book and one adult book by Washington authors to represent the state at the <u>2022 National Book</u> <u>Festival</u>: <u>The Last Cuentista</u> by <u>Donna Barba Higuera</u> and <u>Red Paint: The</u> <u>Ancestral Autobiography of a Coast Salish Punk</u> by <u>Sasha taqwseblu LaPointe</u>.

Both titles will be part of National Center for the Book's <u>Great Reads from Great</u> <u>Places</u> program. The program features books and authors representing the literary heritage of all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and Northern Marianas. For over 20 years the program has included a highlighted youth title from each affiliate center. In 2022, titles for adults are included for the first time.

#### Microsoft Releases Digital Equity Dashboard

Join the <u>Schools, Health & Libraries Broadband Coalition</u> (SHLB) and members of Microsoft for a demo of their new Digital Equity Dashboard.

The demo will be held virtually today, Aug. 10 from 10:30-11:30 am PT. As an organizational member of SHLB, WLA members are welcome to attend. Log in to the <u>Meeting & Events calendar</u> for Zoom access.

Microsoft released its <u>new interactive tool</u>, created by its AI for Good Lab, to help identify places in the United States with significant digital equity gaps. The dashboard goes census tract by census tract, examining 20 different indicators of digital equity — such as broadband access, usage, education, and poverty rates, aggregating public data from the Census Bureau, FCC, BroadbandNow and Microsoft's own broadband usage data. This data, taken together, provides an aggregated "score" of digital inequity in the community.

The Washington State Department of Commerce is seeking proposals from firms interested in providing Digital Navigator services to their communities. <u>View the RFP</u>.

Digital Navigator services, devices, and subscriptions must involve one-on-one culturally literate assistance for people with limited access to services, including individuals seeking work, families supporting students, English language learners, people experiencing poverty, Tribal members, senior citizens, and Medicaid recipients.

The <u>WA State Broadband Office</u> anticipates awarding grants ranging between \$200,000 and \$500,000 per proposal.
