

Last Chance to Apply for the 2022 RIPL Workshop

Washington State Library (WSL) will host up to 65 attendees at a <u>Research Institute of Public Libraries</u> (RIPL) workshop, Oct. 12 and 13, in Kennewick.

During the two workshop days, attendees will receive instruction in:

- designing outcome-based evaluation of programs and services
- community assessment
- techniques for tracking public library data and using these data for planning, management, and demonstrating the library's worth
- using data visualization and storytelling to document the library's impact

WSL will pay for the RIPL presenters, lunch both days, and reimburse lodging for up to two nights at the per diem rate of \$105.00/night plus taxes. Reimbursement will be made to library systems, not individuals.

Paid staff members that work a minimum of ten hours per week for their library are eligible. Applicants must work for a public or tribal library in Washington State. Multiple staff may attend from a library system. Registration must be completed for each staff person. The deadline to apply is today, Aug. 17!

News & Notes

<u>Washington State Library</u> (WSL) <u>has been awarded a \$149,668 grant</u> from the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS).

The grant will fund a pilot program by WSL's <u>Institutional Library Services</u> (ILS) and the <u>State Department of Corrections</u> (DOC) to develop strategies and tools aimed at reducing disparities among library services at state and territorial prisons across the country. The pilot will bring stakeholders together to identify current policies, best practices, performance standards, and outcomes of prison library programs, and develop adaptable models for providing and improving services.

ILS and DOC surveyed 35 states through the <u>Correctional Leaders Association</u>. The responses came from state departments of corrections, and this data was used to determine the level of library services provided in each respondent state's department of corrections facilities. Some prison libraries provide quality services similar to a public library, while some states have no library services at their prisons.

The IMLS grant builds upon the \$1.168 million in recent state funding, spearheaded by State Rep. Drew Hansen, that will allow WSL to expand library services for people who are incarcerated in adult correctional facilities. Services include educational programs, library materials, reference collections, books, and magazines. WSL will hire additional library support personnel for each of the nine state institutional library branches.
