Invitation to Participate: IMLS National Survey - Public Library Maker Programs for Youth with Disabilities

Are you responsible for developing and delivering makerspace or making programming and services in your library? Makerspaces are flourishing in public libraries, yet little is known about the inclusive programming being provided to library patrons, especially youth with disabilities. Makerspace

programming can address inequities in under-served communities (including youth with disabilities), by providing access to various making technologies, skill acquisition through training, and peer and professional mentoring, each critical to today's youth with disabilities who plan to move into the workforce, but also essential for improving each youth's quality of life.

Drs. June Abbas and Yong Ju Jung from the School of Library & Information Studies at the University of Oklahoma are conducting a national survey (funded by the Institute for Museum and Library Services) investigating the current state of programming, design, and accessibility of United States' public library makerspaces' programs for youth with disabilities. They invite you to <u>take their survey here</u>. The survey will take approximately 15 minutes to complete. They plan to present the results of the survey at a future ALA or PLA conference and to share their findings widely on social media and their project website.



Biden-Harris Administration Announces More Than \$175 Million in Internet for All Grants to 61 Minority-Serving Colleges and Universities

The Department of Commerce's National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA) announced it has awarded more than \$175 million to 61 colleges and universities as part of the Connecting Minority Communities Pilot Program. These new awards cover colleges and universities in 29 states and four territories.

With these grants, all funding from this Internet for All grant program has been awarded to 93 universities, including 43 historically black colleges and universities, 24 Hispanic-serving institutions, 21 minority-serving institutions, and five tribal colleges and universities.

Congratulations to UW Tacoma for being a recipient of this grant! The University of Washington (UWT)'s "Connect Across Tacoma: devices, skills, and service expansion for digital equity" project aims to address digital divides in Tacoma, WA, improving broadband access, adoption, and education for students at the University of Washington Tacoma and patrons in its anchor community. UW Capstone Project Seeks to Provide Support for School Library

As part of their capstone project with the University of Washington iSchool, three WLA members and MLIS students are partnering with the <u>Green Hill Academic School Library</u> in Chehalis and project sponsor Julie Forbes to inspire support and reach the goal of purchasing 200 new books for the library.

Green Hill is a library located within Washington State's <u>only fully-fenced</u> <u>maximum/medium security juvenile detention center</u>, serving young men aged 17 to 25 years old. A compilation of books requested by residents are included on the library's <u>Amazon Wishlist</u>.

Also part of the capstone project is raising awareness of the vital role that libraries and reading for pleasure play, as well as reading's particular impact on the mental health and development of growing minds in correctional facilities.

Previously, Green Hill served young men between the ages of 15 and 21 years old. Through advocacy, working with elected officials, and bringing awareness to recent research, Green Hill residents helped change state law to allow juvenile offenders to stay in youth detention centers until the age of 25.

The Learning Curve

EveryLibrary Training: Responding to Challenges

This session will provide a landscape of censorship and book bans in Washington and neighboring states along with a discussion of the Five Freedoms of the First Amendment and civil rights protections in the Fourteenth Amendment.

It is important for library leaders to understand their responsibilities within this framework so that they can communicate effectively about these complex issues with their community, among stakeholders, and with the media. Attempts to ban or censor materials come in many shapes and from several

different directions. When they originate with concerned parents or community members, it is always necessary to engage in difficult conversations. But when they become politicized or performative, it is necessary to understand that they may be driven by an agenda. Recognizing the differences and being properly equipped to address them is key.

Michigan State University presents Automated Accessibility Testing: Advantages and Pitfalls

This webinar will provide an opportunity to share how accessibility was foundational to the development of the Michigan State University (MSU) Libraries' new website, which launched in late 2022. The MSU team is committed to creating an accessible, inclusive, and responsive web presence for the MSU Libraries. They will share their design processes and tools used to develop an accessible and sustainable website.

The MSU team will discuss the process of automating accessibility testing using Cypress.io, an open source end-to-end testing framework used in conjunction with cypress-axe to automate the accessibility checks. This webinar will elaborate on the usage of such tools, similar open-source software, and their incorporation into their development process. They will share their experience in setting up these tools in addition to their usage and their pitfalls in working towards making the MSU Libraries' new website accessible to a wide range of audiences.
