WLA scholarships are professional development and/or memorial scholarships, created and funded by families and friends in memory of their loved ones to honor each person's service to libraries.

This year's scholarships include:

Maryan E. Reynolds Scholarship: \$1000 - \$3000 to one or more WLA members who is enrolled in an ALA-accredited Masters degree program and has completed at least one semester or quarter.

<u>Hahn-Ahlers Continuing Education Scholarship</u>: \$1000 to a WLA member toward a degree, certificate, or graduate-level study in the Library or Education fields.

John Stanford Continuing Education Scholarship: \$1000 to a current WLA member of color toward a degree, certificate, or graduate level study in the

Library or Education fields.

<u>Denny Bond Library Paraprofessional Scholarship</u>: \$500 or \$1000 to a current school library paraprofessional and WLA member toward participation at a local or national library-related conference, workshop, or educational event. 

- Chosen quotes or short selections of your article that you would like highlighted as pull-quotes



2023 ALD/ACRL-WA and ACRL-OR Conference Friday, October 27, 2023 | 8am to 5pm In-person, Lower Columbia College, Longview, WA

Theme: The Work of Libraries

People, and their labor, are the core of academic libraries. This work can be exciting, monotonous, high stakes, invisible, precarious, invigorating, and exhausting. Like other forms of labor, work in academic libraries has changed dramatically since the advent of the pandemic, and continues to change.

This conference is an opportunity to explore the different ways in which we engage with our work. How does your library ensure that others understand and value the labor that goes into providing library services and maintaining library collections? How does your institution value and engage all the workers in your library, including student workers? How do you work during a time of social and political anxiety that has direct ramifications for library workers and library patrons? What does it mean to ensure that your libraries are more equitable places in a time of "DEI work"? What strategies do you use to manage your workload and protect your personal and professional boundaries? What work are you proud of and why?

This conference welcomes proposals that incorporate this theme through case studies and other forms, particularly proposals that are rooted in practical, daily workplace experiences.

The conference is accepting both in person sessions and pre-recorded, asynchronous sessions. Sessions can take the form of:

Lightning talks (10 minutes) Workshops (90 minutes) Unconferences (1-3 hours) Presentations (45 minutes)

Last week, Sen. Jack Reed (D-RI) and Rep. Raúl Grijalva (D-AZ-03) re-introduced the Right to Read Act in the House and Senate to protect school libraries from censorship and disinvestment.

This legislation has a long way to go, but if passed could be a huge step against the book-banning movement. The Right to Read Act would:

- Protect the Constitutional rights of students to access information in school libraries

- Authorize \$500 million in Comprehensive Literacy State Development
 Grants and \$100 million for Innovative Approaches to Literacy Programs
 to help provide needed literacy resources and build strong and effective
 school libraries

Washington Digital Heritage Grants Open for Applications May 15

Washington Digital Heritage Grants provide up to \$15,000 to libraries for digital projects that promote the creation and sharing of digital content documenting Washington's history. Grants are open to public, academic, tribal, and special libraries for projects running through Aug.2024. The 2023-2024 grant will be open for applications May 15 through June 30. Anyone interested can now submit a Letter of Interest for feedback before submitting an application.

Washington Digital Heritage Grants are funded through the Institute of Museum and Library Services.

University of Washington Conducting a School Climate Survey for Educators

The Washington State Board of Education is considering creating and administering a school climate survey for students. School climate refers to qualities or characteristics of the school environment that can have a direct impact on student achievement, behavior, and health. University of Washington Health Projects is interested in learning about different aspects of school climate that you may feel are important.

They hope that you will find the questions important and will want to share your opinions to help shape the direction that Washington state decides to go. They anticipate that completion of this survey will take 10-15 minutes. Please find the survey and more information <u>linked here</u>.

At the end of the survey, you will be asked to click on a link to enter your school's name, which is optional. The sole purpose is to enter your school into a drawing for \$500 and your school name is not connected to your answers. These funds can be used at your school's discretion.
