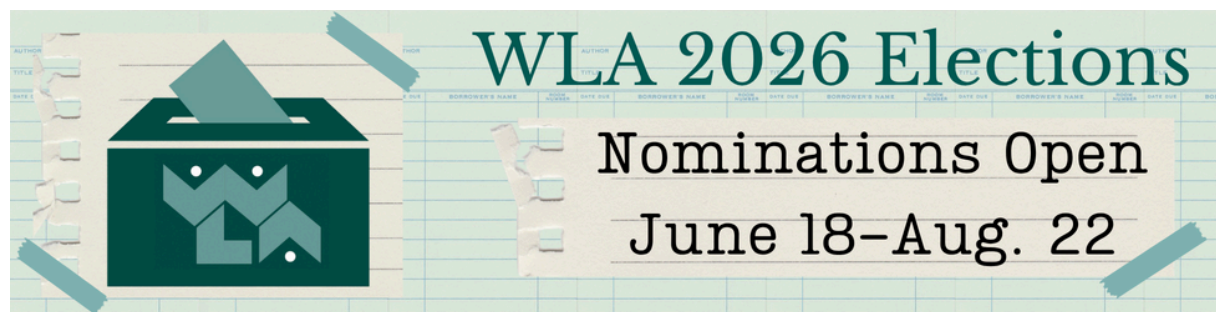

The Internet Archive's [Community Webs](#) program is partnering with the Washington State Historical Society to provide tools, support, training, mentorship, and professional development opportunities to public libraries, community archives, and other community-focused organizations across the state of Washington interested in preserving local stories through web archiving, digital preservation, and community archiving. Cohort members will complete asynchronous training and participate in three virtual discussion groups.

This program is **free** to participating organizations who will receive:

- Access to [Archive-It](#), Internet Archive's web archiving tool and discovery platform
- 1/2 TB of storage in [Vault](#), Internet Archive's digital preservation system
- Collections access in [archive.org](#), a digital library with over 2 million visitors per day
- In-person and online training and technical support
- Opportunities and financial support for networking and professional development

Authors Against Book Bans is Here for Washington

A new state law prohibits schools from banning books used in curriculums solely because they were written by or about members of marginalized groups. Even so, book challenges continue to be a reality and dealing with one can be stressful. Authors Against Book Bans (AABB) in Washington State is dedicated to protecting the intellectual freedom to read and the availability of diverse voices on library shelves.

Comprised of a coalition of writers, illustrators, anthology editors and contributors, AABB offers support to librarians, teachers, and others involved in book challenges. Some of the ways members can help include:

- Writing emails and letters, sending recorded videos, and/or making phone calls to curriculum committees, school boards, and other decision-makers
- Sharing personal experiences demonstrating the importance of diverse books
- Appearing before public meetings in support of diverse books
- Sending personal messages of support (e.g., email or postcards) to individuals embroiled in challenges
