

Alki Call for Papers: Winter Issue - "Resiliency"

Libraries large and small continue to face threats to services and programs, attempts to ban books, and the loss of autonomy. Libraries are facing reduced workforces and, in some cases, threats to their very existence. Library workers are confronting exceptional challenges by modeling resourcefulness and resilience. The winter issue of *Alki* focuses on "resiliency," a theme this journal has

revisited on several occasions. Consider this theme broadly. **Deadline is Friday**, **November 14th!**

Possible topics might include:

- How your library has adapted to the current social/political climate
- Responses to vocational awe, burnout, and your own mental health
- Your own activism
- How you deal with pressures and responsibilities in this ever-evolving profession
- Programs you've created to address tough issues
- Ways you've cared for or supported your community; or ways you've been supported
- Art that responds to or shines a light on the reality of our time

We're also doing a special section on what gives you strength: We are asking library workers to share what keeps you going, what gives you hope or strength right now? Share a brief paragraph and we'll compile these together. Include your name, pronouns, position title, organization, and put "resiliency paragraph" in the subject line. 

The Washington Center for the Book (an affiliate of the Library of Congress Center for the Book administered by Washington State Library) has selected winners in seven categories for the <u>2025 Washington State Book Awards (WSBA)</u> for outstanding books published by Washington authors in 2024. This is the 59th year of the program, formerly called the Governor's Writers Awards.

Washington State Library's Community Book Project

Washington State Library Professional Development Grants

The state library is pleased to return to the regular process for Professional Development grants – applicants can apply when registration pricing becomes available. Maximums of \$1,000/individual and \$6,000/system per federal fiscal year (Oct. 1-Sept. 30). These grants are federally funded by the Institute of Museum and Library Services through the Library Services and Technology Act and are subject to the availability of funds.

EveryLibrary Survey: Financial Costs of Book Challenges to Public Libraries

EveryLibrary, together with Heather Libby, an Adult Services Librarian at the Knoxville Public Library in Iowa, is researching the financial costs of book challenges to public libraries and the taxpayers. Any time a book is challenged, it obviously results in a great many costs–emotional, cultural, intellectual, etc. For the purposes of this study, the focus is on the specific question of what defending libraries and protecting patrons' freedom to read is costing the taxpayers in dollars.

Researchers at UCLA recently published a comprehensive report: <u>Cost of Conflicts</u> <u>Report</u>. This survey would gather similar data from public libraries.

How to Effectively Train Paraprofesionals in Public Libraries: Survey Results

In spring 2024 the User Services in Public Libraries Committee conducted a survey of the reference responsibilities of paraprofessional (non-MLS) workers in public libraries. Using the study's results, we created a practical tool supervisors can use to develop a data-driven training plan for paraprofessional staff. This plan prioritizes the most frequently requested topics in public libraries.

Authors Against Book Bans is Here for Washington

A new state law prohibits schools from banning books used in curriculums solely because they were written by or about members of marginalized groups. Even so, book challenges continue to be a reality and dealing with one can be stressful. Authors Against Book Bans (AABB) in Washington State is dedicated to protecting the intellectual freedom to read and the availability of diverse voices on library shelves.

Comprised of a coalition of writers, illustrators, anthology editors and contributors, AABB offers support to librarians, teachers, and others involved in book challenges. Some of the ways members can help include:

- Writing emails and letters, sending recorded videos, and/or making phone calls to curriculum committees, school boards, and other decision-makers
- Sharing personal experiences demonstrating the importance of diverse books
- Appearing before public meetings in support of diverse books
- Sending personal messages of support (e.g., email or postcards) to individuals embroiled in challenges
